Faculty, Student, and Alumni Achievements

Alumni Awards

The graduate faculty selected two of our outstanding alumni to receive awards.

Dr. Jason Teven has received the 2021 Outstanding Graduate Alumni Achievement Award. This award is presented to alumni whose achievements in their field or vocation have received favorable statewide, national, or international recognition; who have received honors from associations or employers; or whose work has proven beneficial to a pronounced segment of society.

Dr. Teven graduated from our program in 1995, obtained a doctorate in Communication Education from West Virginia University, and now serves as a professor in the Department of Human Communication Studies at California State University, Fullerton, where he has worked since 2006. He is co-author of a leading interpersonal communication textbook, Real Communication (Bedford-St. Martin's Press), in its fifth edition and adopted by over 50 colleges and universities, and is a prominent scholar in the fields of instructional communication and persuasion. He is especially devoted to developing undergraduate and graduate students who have a desire to become college instructors or successful corporate trainers.

Dr. James Ndone has received the 2021 Outstanding New Graduate Alumni Award. This award recognizes significant accomplishment and leadership early in one's chosen professional or academic career. Originally from Kenya, Dr. Ndone graduated from our program in May 2017 and then obtained a doctoral degree from the Missouri School of Journalism in May 2021. He is a crisis communication teacher and researcher with an emphasis on experimental research designs. His research focuses on the role of emotions in a crisis. He has taught classes exploring the intersection of journalism and PR. Dr. Blaney referred to Dr. Ndone as "a young teacher-scholar destined for greatness."

Graduate Student Recognition

Jennifer Zheng, second year graduate student, represented our program at the University 3 Minute Thesis competition this spring. She was required to present her thesis to a layperson audience in 3 minutes. Her thesis, directed by Dr. Joe Zompetti, is titled, "Tm Not a Virus: Asian Hate in Donald Trump's Rhetoric." Of the competition, she said, "It was a great opportunity to not just learn but also discuss the importance of my thesis about Asian Hate to those who may have been unfamiliar with the topic."



Jennifer was also selected by the COM graduate faculty for the Outstanding Graduate Student Award. This award goes to the student who faculty believe demonstrates excellence in teaching, research, and service. Jennifer is starting a doctoral program at the University of Washington in the fall.

Congratulations to first year graduate students Kaylin Lane (pictured below, left) and Hunter Thomas (pictured below, middle) on their publication in the journal *Communication Teacher*. Their article is titled, "Targeting an Audience - A Discussion of Relevant Variables and a Test of Priming" and is based on a teaching activity they created for their fall 2021 Persuasion seminar with Dr. Hunt.







Erianne Thedorf (pictured above, right), a second year COM master's student and GTA for the School of Communication, was awarded the Outstanding Graduate Student Teacher, Masters Level I (having sole responsibility for course instruction) Award at ISU. She was selected from a pool of nominated GTAs representing numerous departments across campus. Awardees are selected for their outstanding contributions to teaching.

Second year graduate student Jatzari Abonce (pictured right) was recently selected as the Outstanding Student Social Media Manager at the annual RedbirdProud Social Media Awards and Workshop for her role in managing the ISU Office of Admissions' social media channels as part of her graduate assistantship. One nominator wrote that Jatzari has "creativity, passion, and [a] collaborative spirit," and is the "type of student who you can hand over the reins to your accounts after very little onboarding."





Recent program graduate Maura Freeman (M.S., 2021) (pictured left) received the College of Arts and Sciences James L. Fisher Outstanding Thesis Award for her thesis titled, "Exceptional Paternal American Heroes Triumph Over Big Bad Terrorists (Again): The Storied Episodes Of Three Presidential Addresses Announcing The Elimination Of Another Middle Eastern Terrorist Threat." Dr. Joe Zompetti advised her thesis project. Maura is the current Plant Communications Coordinator at Rivian.

Did You Know?...

That Dr. Craig has a new podcast available on Apple and Spotify?



The podcast, titled *Tapis Talk*, is a project Dr. Craig has developed for the Office of the Assistant to the President for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion at ISU under Dr. Doris Houston. As Dr. Craig explained about the title of the podcast, "tapis has several different meanings . . . Basically, it refers to a tapestry or richly decorated cloth, used as a hanging or a covering. For my purposes, however, it can also mean 'under consideration' or 'for discussion' and I wanted to play around with all three of these to suggest we are bringing together a rich tapestry that has the possibility of creating something new and beautiful that could bring about change." The purpose of the podcast is to bring a number of different voices together from various areas

including the Assistant to the President for EDI, but also members of the community who are invested in doing this work on our campus, for instance Dr. Shannon Epplett, faculty advisor for TRIBE; Dr. Diane Zosky, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences; Dr. Christa Platt, Director of the Multicultural Center; and Dr. Gavin Weiser who, along with Dr. Craig, is the co-President of the Queer Coalition. Dr. Craig hopes that these conversations "will enlighten our community about the potential EDI work can have, what is already being done on this campus, and how this effectively makes change for students, staff, and faculty on our campus." Ultimately, Dr. Craig hopes that "we hear from a plethora of voices on this campus so that all of us are given an opportunity to voice our accomplishments, concerns, and hopes moving forward."

That we have an informal group of students we refer to as GPAs?

For the past couple of years I have called upon a group of our current students that Dr. Chidester and I informally refer to as "Graduate Program Ambassadors" (GPAs). These students have met (in person and virtually) with prospective students to talk about the program. These GPAs don't get compensated or often acknowledged other than through my "thank you" after a student leaves from their visit. They make a huge difference in our recruiting efforts. When asked about these meetings with prospective students, Evan said, "Meeting with perspective students was a huge privilege! I was in their shoes just 2 years ago, so to be able to serve as a resource of information and encouragement was great." Ben recalled, "Before I came to the US, I had met with other prospective students through Zoom, and it was such a wonderful experience. I felt welcomed and connected before I even made my journey to ISU. This experience is what I would like for our prospective students." I often hear from prospective students that meeting with our current students is one of the highlights of their campus visits and Zoom chats. Thanks GPAs for all of your help in welcoming these students to ISU!

That we have an award winning, nationally recognized forensics team that our GTAs help coach?

Among some of the team's accomplishments this year were: their debaters placed at nearly every tournament throughout the season and qualified the entire team to the National Forensics Association National Tournament; they received invites to the inaugural Rising Stars Round Robin at WKU where the best debaters entering their second year from across the country competed; and they won the novice division of the Gorlok Gala hosted by Webster University.

This year, two of our second year students, Isa Scaturro (pictured right, above) and Zach Thornhill, (pictured right, below) have helped coach our amazing forensics program. Through his coaching experience at ISU, Zach said that he "learned a lot about being an empathetic person" and "became much more organized out of necessity." Isa said that through coaching, she "learned how to love the activity again." Both students also coached while completing their theses projects, about which Zach explained, "it all worked out in the end because our program is known as one of the best in the country and I am graduating on time." Zach will be attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to pursue his PhD and coach with their debate team. Isa will be moving back to the greater St. Louis area and plans to find an adjunct teaching position in that area.
